Supporting Our Police Officers Now, Is More Important Than Ever

The spread of COVID-19 has led to a national lockdown, with states implementing social distancing rules, curfews, and business closures. The lockdown has put immense strain on both the economy and the social lives of everyone in the country, which is making millions of people feel agitated. It does not help that there are reports of criminals and belligerent individuals claiming to have COVID and attempting to transmit to the officers in front of them, turning regular resistance into potential bioterrorist actions.
